# Bago City gears up for Golden Jubilee

Barely a month before its 50th year anniversary as a chartered city, the City Government of Bago led by Mayor Ramon D. Torres is levelling up the preparation for the said occasion.

Mayor Torres assigned HRMO IV/ City Administrator Tricia Matti as the over-all Chairman, Senior Tourism Operations Officer Rosseni Mina as co- chairperson and Councilor Bernadette Somcio as the festival secretariat. The group has started its planning sessions last June including the assignments of different committee chairpersons who will spearhead each event and function.

The theme for this golden jubilee celebration is Bago City @ 50: Great City, Greater Bagonhon. It is a tribute of the City to its distinguished sons and daughters who made names for themselves in the national and international level and at the same time made Bago City a great city because of their achievements.

Also, [www.bagocity50.com](http://www.bagocity50.com) as the official website for the 50th Charter Anniversary. It will serve as portal for Bagonhons who cannot go home during the celebration. It contains the invitational message of Mayor Torres, a countdown to February 19, activities for the celebration and trivia about Bago City. In social media, the City opened Boom D Mascot facebook page and Bago City 50 fan page for all Bagonhons all over the world to be updated with the preparations of the City. On Twitter, @bagocity50 was launched.

Last December 15, Boom, the official mascot of the City for the 50th Charter Anniversary was formally introduced at the public plaza during the switch-on ceremony. Bagonhon artist Aaron Spencer Marin conceptualized the mascot. Also, the Go, Bago song was first played publicly to signal the fast approaching golden jubilee. The song

To honor Bagonhons now residing outside Bago City, the local government prepared a grand reunion for all former Bago City residents dubbed as Balik- Bago 2016- The Grand Bago City Homecoming on February 16, 2016. Also a festival queen search called Diwata sang Bago 2016 will be held on February 13, 2016 at the City Coliseum. Bagonhon women with beauty and brains will compete for the crown. The yearly AGRO Trade Fair is also getting bigger this year with the personnel and officials of the Department of Education at the helm of its preparation. Outstanding Bagonhons who made it big in their chosen careers will be

honoured in a fitting Gawad Bagonhon awards night at the Coliseum on February 18, 2016. Outstanding taxpayers will also be given recognition on that night.

Other events being organized by the City for the enjoyment of the people of Bago includes sports and talent competitions, Fantasia Gold, Golden Accent, Music festival, fireworks competition among others. The City also invited several showbiz personalities to grace the 50th Charter Anniversary of Bago.

Mayor Torres is expecting more people to visit Bago on February 2016 because it is a historic occasion for the city.

# Bago City marks 2016 with 17- minute musical fireworks display

Bago City welcomes 2016 with a grand musical fireworks display featured during the 8th Lights of Bago at the City Sports complex on January 1.

Twenty five thousand people from all over the province attended the event, Bago City PNP estimated. They all cheered when the skies sparkled with multi- colored lights cascaded down in sparkling flames in synch with selected OPM music such as Freddie Aguilar's Anak, APO Hiking Society's Bawat Bata, Choose Philippines' Piliin mo ang Pilipinas, Department of Tourism's It's More Fun in the Philippines, Lea Salonga's Kanta Pilipinas, Gary Valenciano's Shout for Joy and the Dawn's Salamat.

Held every January 1 at the Manuel Y. Torres Sports Complex, the Lights of Bago is dubbed as Negros' Biggest Event for the New Year. It is spearheaded by the City Government of Bago led by Mayor Ramon Torres and LOB action officer Vice Mayor Nicholas Yulo in coordination with the Tourism Office led by Rose Mina and all other agencies tasked to ensure the safety of the spectators.

The event this year also served as a kicked-off ceremony for the 50th charter of Bago City. During the program, the City launched Go Bago as the official song for the

## EMEHMS, STI- WNU tops Bago Fancy Drill tilt

Enriqueta Montilla de Esteban Memorial High School in Pulupandan was declared the ultimate champion in the Battle of the Champions in the recently concluded 7th Invitational Fancy Drill Competition and Battle of the Champions 2015 in connection with the 117th Al Cinco de Noviembre fiesta of Bago City.

EMEHMS which was the 2012 and 2014 champion of the said competition bested Domingo Lacson National High School (2009 & 2011 champion), Bacolod City National High School (2010 champion), and Negros Occidental High School (2013 champion) to win the top prize with a cash prize of P30 thousand and a trophy.

In the regular category, STI- West Negros University was adjudged first place besting 4 other competing schools. They went home with P20 thousand cash prize and a trophy. Lopez Jaena National High School in Murcia

and Carlos Hilado Memorial State College-Binalbagan settled for second and third places respectively and went home with P15 thousand and P10 thousand cash prizes. Other participating schools include Ramon Torres National High School (Bago City) and Central Philippines State University (Kabankalan).

Special awards such as Best Marching Unit, Best in Uniform, Most Disciplined Unit went to STI- West Negros University with a cash prize of P3 thousand for each award and a plaque of recognition. Best Platoon leader was Edghey Sancho also from STI- WNU. He was able to give the solution to the problem solving test given by the judges. Best in Special Number went to Bacolod City National High School with a cash prize of P5 thousand.

The City of Bago invited officials from

the Philippine Military Academy to serve as judges. They were Maj Reynaldo Galido, Jr. of the Philippine Army, Cpt. Charles Dennis Tan of the Philippine Navy, and three drill masters of the academy namely MSg Efenito Bernardino, Jr, TSg Roldan Garcia and TSg Dennis Hernandez.

The criteria for judging composed of 30% during the street fancy drill in the morning and 70% in the arena performance at the coliseum in the afternoon. The Manuel Y. Torres Memorial Coliseum and Cultural Center was full with supporters of each school and spectators. Crowd estimates was at ten thousand.

Bago Mayor Ramon Torres is thanking the schools, principals and university presidents for joining the competition. He is also looking forward for more schools to participate next year. /

**March 7, 2015  
Macau**

Bago City's Aston Palicte, once written off as a talented underachiever, makes a big splash in his international debut, knocking out Mexican journeyman Ismael Garnica. The 24-year-old Palicte (17-1, 15 knockouts) of Bago City, Negros Occidental, Philippines battered Garnica (13-6-1, 5 KOs) throughout the fight, bloodying his nose before referee Eddie Claudio stepped in at the 2:19 mark of their junior bantamweight fight. Palicte trains out of the MP Gym in Davao City under Manny Pacquiao's assistant Nonoy Neri and is promoted by MP Promotions and Top Rank Promotions.

Also, the Bago City arnis team from Ramon Torres National High School, who don the colors of Western Visayas in the Palaro was declared over-all champion of the event. The team is composed of Junnie Rey Pangcobilia, Christian Reyes, Joram Paul Pangcobilia, Robert Escleto and Mark David Puzon. Reyes also bagged the gold medal in secondary boys' anyo single weapon.

In secondary boys' football, Bagonhon Charlie Panes was part of the Western Visayas team that clinched the gold medal, while John Jason Callejas was a member of the elementary football team that placed second to the National Capital Region.

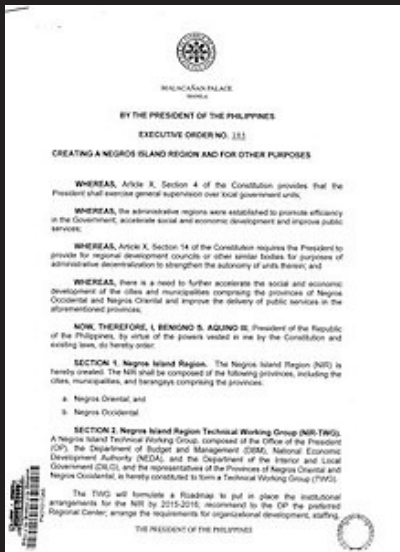

Only the gold and silver medalists in the light flyweight division are given tickets to the Olympiad. The tournament in Doha started with 257 hopefuls from more than 70 countries. According to Coach Nolito "Boy" Velasco who is also a Bagonhon and a brother to boxing superstars Onyok and Ruel, Ladon has 3 more chances to make it to Rio- the Asia- Oceania qualifiers in March next year in China, the Final AOB qualifiers in Azerbaijan in June, and the APB/WSB qualifiers in May in Bulgaria.



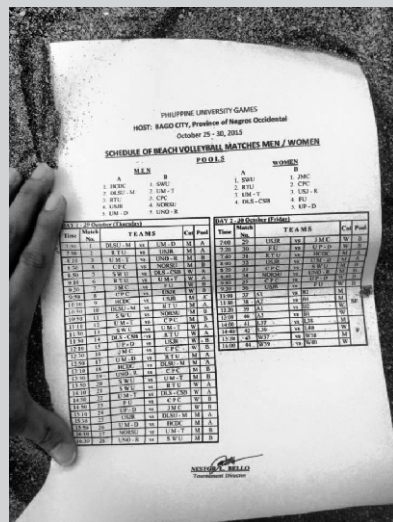
**November 13, 2015

Filipino junior bantamweight prospect Aston Palicte was extended the 12-round limit for the first time in his young career, scoring two knockdowns against tough compatriot Vergilio Silvano en route to a unanimous decision win on Friday, Nov. 13 at the Philippine Navy Gymnasium in Taguig City. The scores were 118-108 on two cards and 116-110 on the third in favor of Palicte (20-1, 17 knockouts), earning the Bago City native his 10th straight victory.

Bago City hosted the Philippine University Games' (UNIGAMES) Men and Women Beach Volleyball Competition at Bantayan Park.

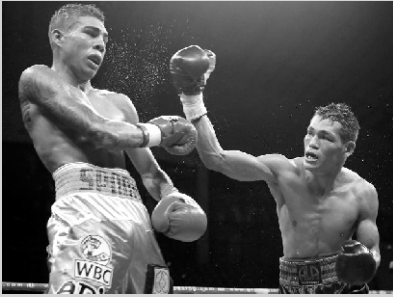


**November 16-18, 2015

Filipino contender Arthur Villanueva rebounded from his loss in a recent title fight with decision wins at Pinoy Pride 34 in Cebu. Bagonhon Arthur Villanueva (28-1) defeated Victor Mendez (19-3) by split decision at Hoops Dome in Cebu for the WBC International Super Flyweight title. Villanueva — who was coming off a 10-round technical decision loss in an IBF junior bantamweight title fight against McJoe Arroyo in July - fought more assertively than he had in at least two years. Villanueva pressed his advantage in round four as he caught Mendez, 22, coming in with a flush right counter towards the end of round five. Mendez never showed signs of being hurt, and instead continued to answer back with stiff right hands of his own which marked up Villanueva's face. Two judges scored the fight 117-111 and 116-112, while the third scored it 115-113 for Mendez.

# Christmas in the Streets of Brgy. Calumangan

Philippines is known to celebrate the longest Christmas season the world. As the first day of September breaks, the countdown for Christmas begins. Many would start playing Christmas carols everywhere or even set up their Christmas trees. Months of preparation before the most awaited celebration, but it will never be complete without hanging a colorful and star-shaped Christmas lantern in the houses of every Filipino people – the Parol. In Barangay Calumangan Bago City, you'll get to meet Tatay Jose Lapatan, a 73-year-old man who never thought of sharing the vibrancy of Christmas to everyone through his works of art.

He was on his sixth grade when Tatay Jose started his business turned school project. Without enough money to buy ready-made lanterns, he used his innate talent to create one. He began framing different sizes of stars out of bamboo sticks and even used sugar cane tassels or bilaho. Then he wrapped his star with a piece of wax paper with the aid of starch or tayubong. When he was in high school, he was awarded as the Most Outstanding in Craftmanship. Tatay Jose later discovered various ways of improving the design of his artwork and this impressed anyone who happened to see his masterpiece. Due to an unexpected demand he started selling it.

From a starting capital of fifty pesos, he was able to create 300 small, medium and large stars with prices ranging from three to twenty pesos. His two younger sisters were







his companion in making the orders. As the eldest among the six, he used this opportunity to help his parents in their finances. Years have passed and hundreds turned into thousands. His works were known to many, not only in the city of Bago but also in its neighboring cities and municipalities.

Schools, churches, public and private companies and hospitals were among his yearly customers. Though in doubt of accomplishing a bulk of orders at first but the positive feedback from his clients proved the quality of his work. This what makes Tatay Jose busy every year, the reason why he need more hands in making the parols.

His neighbors were his back up and they were more willing to help him. The people whom he asked for help were mostly unemployed. "Mga tambay lang ang kalabanan sa ila amo na ang rason nga ginpangayo ko ang ila bulig para may ipuli man sila sa ila pamilya," Tatay Jose said. Two is better than one and thirty is far way better than two. It may sound many but, yes, he helped at least 30 people earn a living.

Over the years, parols have evolved from the common star-shape to more complicated designs using specialized materials such as molded wires, capiz shells and mostly lighted with bulbs... such a perfect way to maintain its beauty even through the night. This evolution is sometimes a threat to Tatay Jose's business. There were times that his customers would prefer the modernized lanterns rather than his "ordinary" art. When

we was about to lose hope, he remembered something that could help him in his production. He, too, started using wires in molding animal and abstract designs, increased the size of his parol and used colorful metallic papers in wrapping them. He also started making this another traditional symbol of a Filipino Christmas, the Belen – a three-dimensional art that depicts the Nativity scene of Jesus Christ.

Opportunities come Tatay Jose's way. With the help of his family and friends, he was able to join various parol making contests and with the unique and artistic details of his work, he bagged major and special prizes. "Dako man nabulig sang mga contest sa akon kag sa pamilya ko kay didto mas damo ang nakakita sang ikasarang ko sa paghimo sang parol kag mas nakilala pa gid ang negosyo namon," he added.

He starts framing his parols August of every year and opens his business on the first week of November, just in time for the *Al Cinco de Noviembre*. Tatay Jose normally makes three to five pieces of parols a day, a total of 30-35 pieces every week.

At the present time, his lantern costs P20.00 to P2,500.00 due to the price increase of the materials he is using, yet still the cheapest compared to some commercialized and modernized lanterns. From the starting capital of P50.00, he now alots P3,000.00 for his yearly project. As he waits for the next Christmas season, Tatay Jose used to work as a carpenter and sometimes sell indian mangoes along the streets.

These days, as you pass by the place known as "Taclaron" in the said barangay, you will happen to see a series of parol displays on the both sides of the streets. These are actually the creations of those people who started as helpers of Tatay Jose. They were able to put up their own parol businesses with indulgence shown to their so called "master".

It's been 60 years since Tatay Jose started his one-stop business but you may see him sitting in a small kubo beside a waiting shed, wearing old polo and pants, facing his everyday companion – rugby, bamboo sticks, metallic and wax papers. "Indi man makapamanggaranon sa akon ang makita ko sa negosyo ko kay indi man bilog nga tuig ga baligya ko lantern, ang ginansya ko amo na ginagamit namon sa sulod sang panimalay samtang ga hulat naman sang madason nga paskwa," he said.

Tatay Jose is an example of a genuine hero who would rather give what he have and extend his helpful hands to the needy than putting himself first.

Christmas to him is not having wealth but good health; not having clean and new clothes but a pure heart; not having a beautiful place to live but a place to call home; not to sell overpriced products but to sell cheaper and give more happiness; and it is not about getting old but having a new life.

Thus, the legend of his parol continues to live in the hearts of his kasimanwas and through his parol, he is able to spread the real essence of the celebration to everyone./

## A Week of Working Together

Of course it is a bit demanding especially for an oldie like me to be on top of such a youth-oriented, rapid unfolding week but the valuable effort and help of Sir Edwin de Nicolas, Edna Lobrido, Yve Narazo, Lea Pilipina Canayon and the helpful staff of the City Planning and Development Office, the City Social Welfare and Development Office and the Sangguniang Panlungsod makes the week truly worthwhile and unforgettable for the participating student leaders.

The celebration of the Linggo Ng Kabataan seemed to bring out the best in our local government offices and some national offices. 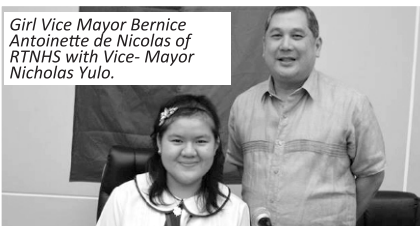

We are surprised we feel energized despite the extra work. It must be the magic of youth infusing us with their attitude that nothing can be so serious in life, they cannot be put aside for the moment.

Personally, our best hour this year was when Vice Mayor Nikko commended the B & G Vice Mayor (Bernice Antoinette de Nicolas) and the ten B & G Councilors for a work done very smoothly, actually in conducting the Session of the Week on October 20, 2015. I realized how really malleable the minds of the young are. The Boys and Girls actually

took over our seats at the SP and we sat as advisers or prompters at their sides. We were amazed at how readily they took over, making a record of five privilege speeches in one session of matters they have observed around them like the dark streets that make them afraid when they go home (GSPM Kaye Galon), cigarette selling by vendors at a city-owned compound just outside the fence of RTNHS to students and minors (BSPM Ivan Jacinto), minors driving single motorcycles dangerously on the streets of most Barangays (BSPM Gildo Carlo Famoso), the outright violation of the Ordinance on Regulation of Computer Gaming Stations (GSPM Shenery Ejes), and the unfinished portion on the crossing of the streets General Luna and Biente Dos which was hazardous for drivers and commuters on tricycles alike (GSPM Nicole Dote).

Better also was their resolve to find out what happened to their privilege speeches. They attended the Committee Meetings two weeks after and participated actively. In my mind I was saying with young people like these, there is hope, big hope for Bago and the country. Another satisfaction on their side must be to discover that they were taken seriously and that some of their presented problems were acted upon immediately (GSPM Dote's complaint). In most offices, the B & G acquitted themselves passably, learned by observing, listening, and doing; made recommendations in their evaluations; and unanimously said, "the week was too short, it should be a one-month Linggo". The inevitable tears came at the Culmination Program in the BAMR Gym. Parting is, indeed, a sweet sorrow but our best hope is that the learning and significance of the week will never be lost on the government men and women involved and the young student leaders who participated. /

## The story of Bago City's Outstanding BNS Magdalena Yales

In the name of public service, one must be patient enough in extending hands to the needy. No matter how far a place may be and no matter how steep the roads can be, a real public servant is the one who knows how to sacrifice his own personal life in prioritizing the real purpose of his existence. This is the reason why a Bagonhon, in another field, was recognized and ended victorious. For her fourth year in service, Maria Magdalena B. Yales, a Barangay Nutrition Scholar of Barangay Abuanan, Bago City did not expect of achieving an honor that paid all her hardships away.

Her journey started when she was designated to take over the responsibility of monitoring children ages 0-71 months in their barangay through a community survey. Yales, together with some barangay health workers travel for hours every day for a period of three months covering the 12 puroks of Abuanan to locate and identify malnourished children. The annual weighing of the children, as a top requirement will serve as their basis in providing appropriate assistance that could revive the child's growth. Her task also includes conducting an interview with the mother on raising her child as

well as identifying resources in every family that contributes to the wholeness of a child's health.

Due to an exemplary report submitted to the City Nutrition Committee, the 48-year-old BNS stood out among the 42 more BNS of the city. Her documents showed a huge difference in turning almost half of the identified malnourished children to a normal status. The records were evaluated by Ms. Josephine de la Chica, officer-in-charge of CNC that made her advanced to the regional level.

The Regional Nutrition Evaluation Team (RNET) headed by Ms. Delilah Gilongos, Nutrition Officer I, conducted the regional evaluation to the qualified BNS and soon hailed Yales as the Regional Outstanding BNS of Western Visayas and made her continue to the national level.

More than 42 thousand BNS all over the country were among her competitors. With great surprise and pride, she was among the 8 finalists who vied for the National Outstanding BNS award. Through this, officers of the National Nutrition Office headed by Ms. Maria-Bernadita Flores made a personal visit in Brgy. Abuanan to assess

Magdalena. The team were warmly welcomed by the CNC members lead by Hon. Mayor Ramon D. Torres, Vice Mayor Nicolas Yulo, Sangguniang Panlungsod members, City Health Officer-Designate Dr. Ferdinand Ramon Mayoga, Sociologist I Ms. Yve Narazo and Education Supervisor I for EPP/TLE Ms. Cecilia Lavadia.

"Wala ko mag laum nga ako ang ma mapilian sa city, pati na sa region kay ginhimo ko man lang ang akon nga obligasyon bilang isa ka BNS kag kun ano man ni ang nabaton ko nga award, ginapasalamatan ko gid ni sa tanan nga nag suporta kag nag bulig sa akon," Magdalena said.

The awarding ceremony for the national level was held last 29th of October at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC) in Pasay City, Metro Manila. Though she wasn't able to bring home the title, Yales is grateful enough of the recognition she had. "Bangud sang ini nga award, mapasalig ko guid ang mga pumuluyo sang Brgy. Abuanan nga mas mapaayo ko pa guid ang akon serbisyo sa ila kay nahibalan ko nga sila ang nagasalig man sa akon," Yales added./

### *Of Santa Claus and the Belen*

I was mildly surprised when I arrived home. The walls flanking our small altar were decorated with big squares of faux green pine leaves at each center of which hung two, big red and green socks, the kind you see everywhere in malls, stores. These were what Santa, that fat, jolly red-faced guy was supposed to fill with gifts if the kids had been good through the days leading to Christmas. They reminded me acutely of my childhood Christmases when we actually had hung big men socks at my grandmother's house which we had believed Santa would fill up with goodies. We slept so late every time negating our own resolve to wait for Santa and see if he was truly real. Alas, we were not so resolved after all. We would feel asleep sometime in the night after waiting so long. And in the morning, lo and behold – the socks were filled, never mind, that it could sometimes be one dried up apple, a bland tasting orange, too many candies and biscuits, and a toy that got completely dismembered by mid-afternoon. We were elated - it was true there was a Santa Claus!

I did not know when Santa stopped thinking of us – it must be when I was already in higher elementary grades and early high school when we already stayed at our own house either in the farm or at Central Ma-ao. I no longer could recollect Santa coming or dropping by the house. By then my father was working at the sugar mill and my mother must have been too tired (after eight, nine, ten and later eleven children) to watch for Santa and make sure that he did not miss our house. Neither can I remember when after many years I started to stop talking about Santa Claus to my children and threatened them of Santa not passing by if they were not good boys especially in the months before Christmas.

I am not sure if many parents still



talk about Santa Claus to their children nowadays. Parents today seem to have infected their children with indifference or outright disbelief in Santa Claus. Many I think could not even explain who Santa Claus is or was. He now seems to be insignificant - that ubiquitous red and white figure, a given, hanging or sitting (One was even going up and down a twine.) everywhere in the malls, in magazines or over television directing the attention of shoppers or convincing them to buy a better brand of house appliance. They also make parents crazy over their children pointing out and wanting what Santa is manipulating at the moment. He is the figure reduced to a joker prancing and somersaulting in front of TV audiences while wise-cracking inane supposed to be jokes. He has lost his stature as a great leverage in making children behave better in exchange for those unexpected or longed for gifts. Santa has lost his importance just as many things of our childhood have slowly vanished into intentional oblivion.

Thinking back on the decoration in the house – I try to be very tolerant, giving everyone the latitude to exercise their creative juices (though it may not be my style). I try to explain the meaning of the four socks on the wall – saying those were the socks of each of the kid-representing the wish that Santa can come by and deliver gifts. I do not know if they listen or believe. I doubt, as kids nowadays, don't tend to believe their elders anymore. I look at one corner and there is the Christmas Tree not completely garnished yet. It is still several weeks before Christmas! I give these decorations a second and third look and I feel something is missing. This morning as I play with my almost fifteen-month grandchild I realize what is missing - amid the reason for the decorating, for the gaily put up tree, for the hanging socks, for the glittering balls, for the greens and white make-believe snow – what is missing is the nativity set in which Jesus is the center of it all! /

## Bago FLUP Reviewed by Regional Experts

DENR Region 6 invited Bago City and other LGU recipients of their technical assistance in the preparation of the Forest Land Use Plan for Plan Presentation and Technical Review last December 1, 2015 at Madison Hotel, Iloilo City.

The contingent from this City presented the City FLUP to the Regional Technical Review Committee composed of the top level leadership of the DENR Regional Office VI headed by ARD Jesse L. Vego. The Team is headed by SPM Cleo Gaudite, SEMS Vicente D. Mesias, PDO II Edna A. Lobrido, Statistician I Perpetua C. Amanquion and GIS Personnel Harlem D. Romero.

The presentation of the City FLUP is a pre-requisite to the approval by the DENR Regional Director and subsequent MOA signing between the LGU and DENR for its implementation.

The purpose and objective of Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) is to build consensus and develop recommendations on the best uses of forest lands, including the important step of identifying open access areas and determining appropriate management incentives and best resource managers for these open access areas. It provides the basis for allocating forest and forestlands (FFL) under appropriate management and tenure arrangements and its consequent assignments to qualified stewards or manager with established accountabilities.

Immediately after the presentation and review, ARD Jesse L. Vego of DENR Region VI, commended the Team from Bago for coming up with the Plan. He thanked Mayor Torres, Vice Mayor Yulo and the rest of the officials for accepting the partnership with the DENR, and acknowledged the efforts of the assigned personnel that joined the workshops that led to the realization of the FLUP. He stressed that with the FLUP and the kind of good environmental governance known of Bago City, he looks



forward to a successful implementation of the proposed interventions and a sustainable environment for Bagonhons.

## City Gov't. Distribute Funds to MEBSAP Partners

Just in time with the Yuletide Season, the City Government of Bago released the second and third quarter tranche of its financial assistance to project partners of the Multipartite Ecologically Balance and Sustainable Agro-forestry Project (MEBSAP) in Barangays Mailum and Ilijan.

Last December 21, 2015, the City Officials headed by Mayor Ramon D. Torres and Vice Mayor Nicholas M. Yulo handed the Php462,900.00 financial support to a total of 61 beneficiaries of Barangays Mailum and Ilijan.

The main objective of the project is to establish, operate, sustain and continually improve a system of livelihood activities for the communities of the City leading towards standards of charcoal production that is environmentally sound, socially responsive and economically viable. The project employs five components as follows: 1. community participation; 2. fuel wood/coffee/fruits trees establishment and management with financial support through a zero interest loan; 3. bulk marketing support through a buy back scheme of charcoal, coffee and other produce; 4. advocacy and networking with focus on sustainable fuelwood management and marketing

leading towards nationally and internationally accepted standards; and 5. monitoring and evaluation systems to ensure project and community accomplishments versus project objectives and policies. The project is already on its third year of a three year establishment period and is about to commence in providing bulk marketing support to the beneficiaries.

With the Project, it is envisioned that illegal activities resulting to the destruction of the Mt. Kanlaon Natural Park will be minimized if not totally eradicated. This will ensure that the existing forest cover will continue to expand to serve as carbon sink and repository of water that sustainably flows and irrigates agricultural lands, and domestic and industrial needs of water within the Bago River Watershed.

In a speech delivered during the cash distribution, Mayor Torres encouraged the sincere participation and support of the beneficiaries in ensuring the successful implementation of the project as the same is a trailblazing best practice that will enshrine among the City's replicable projects. He stressed that the City Government is doing its best in complying its obligation under MEBSAP, and hopes that the project partners will do their part and encourage others to do the same, so that the ends the project seeks to achieve, which are sustainable supply of water in Bago River Watershed, sustainable livelihood for the people, and healthy and bio-diverse environment, are successfully met./

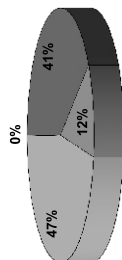

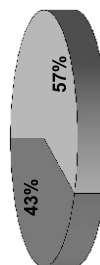
EXPENDITURES BY EXPENSE CLASS

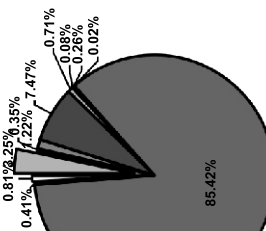
INCOME VS. EXPENDITURES
